# **Fort Worth**

Fort Worth began in 1849 as an army outpost protecting settlers from Indians. It grew rapidly after the Civil War due to its location on the Chisholm Trail, on which cattle were driven to Kansas to be transported via train—earning it the nickname "Cowtown." The name stuck, and the now cosmopolitan city still uses a longhorn steer as part of its official logo and maintains the Fort Worth Stockyards as a historic district and tourist destination. But people who call the area home know this city's present encompasses more than its past.

In the last decade, it has been one of the fastest-growing areas in the country, and Fort Worth is continually recognized by *Money*, *Fortune*, and other magazines as one of the best places to live and work in the United States. A healthy job market, affordable housing, and the energy associated with several colleges and universities contribute to its vibrancy. And then you have the cultural offerings: Fort Worth has exceptional museums (including Kimbell Art Museum, Amon Carter Museum of American Art, and The Modern) and galleries, as well as the gorgeous Bass Performance Hall in Sundance Square. The general vibe of Fort Worth is different from that of Dallas, and though outsiders usually tie together the cities, they are distinct in many ways.

# Grapevine

The City of Grapevine is a go-to destination, providing a convenient escape from the big city. One can explore the city's historic downtown, discovering more than 80 locally owned shops, boutiques, wine tasting rooms, restaurants, and art galleries. One can also play 81 holes of golf or take advantage of more than 8,000 acres of recreation on Lake Grapevine. Grapevine is home to Grapevine Mills, Bass Pro Shops, and an abundance of antiques, arts and crafts, galleries, wines from around the world, and handcrafted items such as Vetro Glass Blowing. One can find entertainment in places like Legoland, SeaLife Aquarium, Meow Wolf, Main Event, and several other family-friendly entertainment venues. And if you do not have a car, you can ride the DART from Dallas or TexRail from Fort Worth, directly into not just Grapevine but also the DFW Airport! Both trains go to Harvest Hall at the Hotel Vin right at the intersection of Main Street and Dallas Road, providing a leisurely walk to enjoy Grapevine.

Irving was founded in 1903 and still retains some of its historical charm. The Mayberry-like downtown even has a drugstore with a rare operating soda fountain.

Las Colinas, however, mixes high-rise office buildings with apartments and family homes set around golf courses and lakes. Residents can explore the Mandalay Canals on gondolas, view the realistic sculpture Mustangs of Las Colinas, and check the time on the huge flower clock. The Toyota Music Factory complex offers global dining and concerts at the Pavilion. The Campion Trails greenbelt passes through one of the area parks and is great for walking and biking.
